Sunday, May 22nd at 11 AM: "Learning from Hiroshima, Peace Memorial City" with Madelyn Holmes

Cities are an underused avenue for negotiating world peace. Since 1959, Hiroshima has worked toward reconciliation, not revenge; making friends, not enemies through sister city diplomacy. Hiroshima's mayors and citizens have created a powerful counterpoint to war scenarios with its six sister cities: Honolulu (USA); Volgograd (Russia); Hannover (Germany); Chongqing (China); Daegu (South Korea); Montreal (Canada). They have undertaken concrete actions for peace, commemorated war victims and engaged in wide-ranging cultural exchanges of youth, musicians, artists, sports competitors, and gardens.

• Madelyn Holmes is a Ph.D. historian and author of six nonfiction books including Hiroshima and its Six Sister Cities, published in January 2022. A graduate of Radcliffe College, Dr. Holmes has taught at universities in England, the USA, Canada, and China. She has been a peace activist since the 1960s: secretary of the World Disarmament Campaign in Stevenage, UK; board member of the Sister City Association connecting Cambridge, Massachusetts with Yerevan, Soviet Union; and editor of Sister Miriam Ward's book Behind the Wall: Palestinians under Occupation.
