Free Money! Free Money! Free Money!


Now here's something you never expected to get via Harvard.

Jonathan Cohen:

With great sorrow, I must report that our classmate **Paul Jefferson** died on March 23, 2023 in Southampton, PA.I am attaching a draft death notice that I submitted to *Harvard Magazine* on April 5, but I haven't heard back from them since then so I don't know when it will be published. He is survived by his life partner, Lydia P. Quill (home address: 835 Woods Rd., Southampton, PA 18966).

Paul Channing Jefferson '66 *mcl*, Ph.D. '76 died March 23, 2022 in Southampton, PA. He was a professor emeritus of history at Haverford College. Paul was born in Grand Rapids, Michigan on September 26, 1944 and grew up in Chicago where he graduated from the Francis W. Parker School. At Harvard he majored in History and Literature and received a Ph.D. in History of American Civilization. He declined a Fulbright Fellowship to the University of Paris in 1967 in order to serve as Associate Director of Yale Summer High School 1967 – 1968

Paul taught history, philosophy, economics, and African American studies at the Commonwealth School in Boston from 1977 to 1981. He joined the faculty of Haverford College in 1981. He was recognized as an enthusiastic, dedicated and highly regarded teacher who delighted in introducing generations of students to the value of clear thinking and close reading in the courses he taught about American intellectual history, including upper level seminars on American constitutional law and African American intellectual history. He retired from Haverford in 2010 to enjoy his interests in chess, traveling, and scholarly thought and spirited discussion.

He leaves his life partner, Lydia P. Quill, 3 step-children, 7 step-grandchildren, and his sister, Kristin Jefferson.
