## J. Chester Johnson:

## Calling Forth The Elaine Race Massacre

## by J. Chester Johnso

A few years ago, a very small number of Americans had ever heard or were cognizant of the Elaine Race Massacre. More recently, we have witnessed a major expansion in the knowledge of this national tragedy among an increasing share of the American population, although a consequential number of United States citizens are still ignorant about those bloody days in Phillips County, Arkansas during early October, 1919 when local white citizens, white vigilantes from Mississippi, Tennessee, and neighboring, Arkansas communities, and white federal troops with machine guns murdered Black sharecroppers and their family members.

Articles by the *Smithsonian, Associated Press, The Guardian, The New York Times*, etc., amid considerable public discussion and commentary, have increased awareness of the Massacre, which could arguably be the most significant attack by whites against Blacks in our country's history. It is also my belief that the Library of Congress probably chose my book, **Damaged Heritage**, to be included in the Library of Congress shop – at least, in part – as a result of the book's focus on the Elaine Race Massacre.

My friend, Steve McAleer, who organized a recent discussion on **Damaged Heritage** by a men's book club in Providence, Rhode Island for which I participated via zoom, just brought to my attention a new book, **The Presidents and The People**, released in July, 2024 and published by W. W. Norton & Company. The author is Professor Corey Brettschneider of Brown University. This book devotes three pages to the Elaine Race Massacre, mainly in connection with the approach taken by President Woodrow Wilson toward race relations at the time, which, in the words of the author, led to "the outpouring of Black blood". There is no question that this outpouring of Black blood included the Elaine Race Massacre.

While I may not agree with all the facts about the Massacre as Professor Brettschneider reports them, it is important to acknowledge that the inclusion of the Elaine Race Massacre in this book represents another example of a burgeoning recognition that the Massacre constitutes an important, if not an essential moment in American history.

The book contrasts the terrible violence surrounding the largely unknown Elaine Race Massacre along the Mississippi River Delta in 1919 with the remarkably poignant, racial reconciliation that occurred a hundred years later between a black woman and a white man, descendants of opposite sides of the Massacre.
