Your happy G&S reference reminds me I was VP of the Harvard G&S Society in '66.

I arrived at Harvard as an AP sophomore in 1963. I had been in some high school plays, so my first stop was the Loeb Drama Center, where I got cast in Durrenmatt's *The Visit*, translated & directed by Ken Tigar '64, produced by Tim Mayer & filled with the Harvard stars of the era - Lynn Milgram, Laura Esterman, Mark Bramhall, Andreas Tauber, Arthur Friedman. We opened in Nov but had to pause (along with the Harvard-Yale game) for the weekend when JFK was shot. The University wanted to cancel further performances entirely, but Ken Tigar fought bravely to finish the run – it was his translation & thesis project, that he'd worked years to complete. We were finally allowed to perform the following weekend, on condition that we cut all references to widowhood. This proved difficult, as the play is about *The Visit* of, um, a widow to her hometown. We muddled through – I remember changing a reference to *The Merry Widow* to *The Gondoliers*" to bewildered applause.


All my time at Harvard I was either rehearsing or performing a show. Tim Mayer's production of G&S's *Utopia Ltd.* for which John Lithgow learned to sing, dance & juggle. "Major Barbara" with Trish Hawkins & Stockard (then Susan) Channing. "Duel of Angels" with Emily Levine ...

Later, Ken Tigar & I performed at The Proposition, an improv troupe in Cambridge & off-Broadway in NYC. Our careers then diverged, Ken on stage, TV & films – most recently a 1-man show in London – me less visible in dozens of regional theatre roles, scores of voice-overs & hundreds of audiobooks. I last saw Ken at a Proposition reunion 10 years ago, where we recalled the Cambridge years.

I called Don to see what the back story on the gift was. Here's what I learned:

In the 1990's and early 2000's Don made quarterly gifts to Harvard College, on a strictly secret basis, as he did not want to publicize his financial success, due to his competitive relationship with the Oklahoma utility company. At the time, Don wanted to fund a Professorship in honor of his mentor, John Kenneth Galbraith.

In early 2024, Don learned from the Development Office that the amount of the funds had grown to \$18-\$20 million and was now large enough to establish a full professorship. Over the 30 years, Don's interests changed from wanting a Galbraith type of figure ... to wanting Harvard to hire a world-renowned scholar in environmental economics... and, if possible, in the area of combating global climate change.

Don learned this summer from an old friend in the Kennedy School, Robert Stavins, that Harvard had recently wanted to hire such a scholar with a named professorship, but the expected funds were not allocated by the Dean. Then Don decided to direct his Professorship to such a person..... hopefully in time to hire the scholar Harvard had in mind.

Don is thrilled to establish a Professorship in the area of his current passion. From the early 2000's to today Don's interest in combating climate change grew to the point that it culminated in his founding a new company, EnviroBeef, last year. The company provides a patented combination of cattle feed supplements which produces beef with medically significant levels of omega-3s like ocean fish, and from cattle which do not burp methane, which otherwise contribute hugely to climate change. See www.envirobeef.biz. He is raising capital now to complete work to initiate commercial operation next year.

The group picture is my Aussie family taken at the conclusion of the Bar Admission ceremony outside the Supreme Court of Western Australia in downtown Perth.








William Neaves:
